COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

FELLOW-MEMBERS.

We have pleasure in submitting to you the following Report for the Quarter ended October 14th, 1922, and trust same will meet with your approval.

The SALES for the Quarter totalled £55,830, 17s. 3d., being an increase of £1,931 upon the previous Quarter, but a decrease of £12,714 upon the corresponding period of last year. We trust our Members will do their utmost to give all their trade to the various departments of the Society. The condition of the markets have continuously called for the very careful revision of our prices in order to carry out our policy of selling at the lowest possible prices with the highest of quality.

The BREAD OUTPUT for the Quarter has been 73,551 stones, as compared with 70,605 stones for last Quarter, and 74,177 stones for the corresponding Quarter of last year. This does not include Milk Bread. of which we sell a considerable quantity. We venture to state that our Bread is the very best it is possible to make, and trust that you will not purchase elsewhere when you can buy "CO-OP. BREAD" and be satisfied.

This shows a decrease of 29, but 118 accounts have been closed owing to the cessation of trade on the part of the Members who were holding these accounts. The real increase is 89 for the Quarter.

The PURCHASES by the Members equal 11s. 84d. per week, as compared with 12s. 01d. per week for last Quarter, and 14s, 11d. for the corresponding Quarter of last year. INTERIM DIVIDEND,—This we recommend to be 9d. in the £, and to be paid out in the Baths and Institute on December 7th, 8th, and 9th, 1922.

NEW BOOT SHOP.—The work in connection with the New Boot Shop is nearly completed, and, when the fitting out of the building is finished, we have no hesitation in saying that it will be a fine place, and should prove a valuable acquisition to the Society. Please give all the support you can to this department, as no Boots or Shoes can be obtained to give better service than those supplied through your own Society.

CASH SYSTEM.—During the Quarter we have had installed at the Colehill Premises a new Cash Carrier. For some years the Rapid Wire System has been unsatisfactory, it generally breaking down just at the busiest periods of the trade for the week. It is hoped that this installation will prove very useful to the Members and the Assistants, and obviate the necessity of Members having to wait for their change.

BAKERY HOT PLATE.—It has also been deemed necessary for a new Hot Plate to be fixed in the Bakery Department, as the old one was very antiquated, and did not tend towards a satisfactory output of Pikelets, Scotch Scones, &c. Now that the new Plate has been installed, we shall be able to have a larger output of these Hot Plate Goods, and thus saye disappointment to Members.

ARTESIAN BORE.—The Artesian Bore at Halford Street is now completed, and a yield of 12,000 gallons per day has been procured. The water has been analysed, and is satisfactory. To save the work of continuous pumping it is necessary to sink a well 80 feet deep by the side of the Bore, and a passage cut to allow the water to run from the Bore into the well. It is also necessary to have a Tank fixed so that the water can be pumped from the well to this, and then distributed over the various departments through pipes running from the tank.

TAILORING DEPARTMENT.—For some time the trade done in this department has been falling off, and we now find the output does not warrant a separate department. It was, therefore, thought advisable to close down the department, and all orders for Tailoring Goods will be in future taken in the Outfitting Shop on Colehill. We feel confident this will prove satisfactory, as a good fit and up-to-date style can be guaranteed in all the work entrusted to us, which will be made by practical and competent workmen.

SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING.—The Special General Meeting, called after the last Quarterly Meeting, being adjourned, owing to each Member having to be given officially two days' notice, we have considered that such expense should not be incurred at the present time; and, as there are other Rules requiring amendment to bring them up to date, we advise this matter stand over to a more propitious time.

By the time this Report reaches you it will be close upon the Festive Season, and we now take the opportunity of wishing you a Happy and Peaceful Christmas and a Prosperous New Year.

In addition, such meetings give a valuable opportunity to Members of the General, Educational, and Propaganda Committees, and the Officials, to converse with and explain to any individual Member any matter the Member is desirous of knowing more about.

It is proposed to hold further Meetings in the near future in other districts. We think this work should prove very valuable to the Society, and we hope it will increase the trade, and, by increasing trade, help us to get into a position to pay a larger dividend. We appeal to all Members to help us to help them by increased loyalty in all departments.

NOTICES.

Every Member is particularly requested to peruse the following, and their compliance with same is asked for:-

Clothing Club—Easy Payments.—Subscriptions to this are received at any time, the amount so received being from 6d. to 5s. All moneys must be expended in the Drapery, Clothing, Boot, Coal, or Furnishing Departments.

Members' Attention is directed to Rule XX., whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense, and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

Small Savings Bank.—Deposits are received at any time during office hours. Sums from One Penny to Ten Shillings may be deposited, but not more than £20 can be on deposit at one time. Interest at the rate of £4. 3s. 4d. per cent per annum is paid on each sum of Four Shillings remaining on deposit for three months.

Loans.—Deposits received at any time during office hours. Interest at the rate of £4. 10s. per cent per annum.

Members Changing their Address should intimate the same to the Secretary. A Form is placed at the end of this Report for that purpose, and much annoyance will be saved to the staff if we can be advised of any alteration.

Co-operative Insurance.—We are in a position to effect Insurances of all kinds—Life, Fire, Burglary, Live Stock, and Accident. The risk is covered by the Joint Insurance Department of the C.W.S and S.C.W.S., and Co-operators should be convinced of the necessity of some Insurance and apply at once to the office for all information relating to the various branches of our Insurance Business.

National Health Insurance.—Under the C.W.S. we are an Approved Section for the purposes of the Insurance under the Act. As in every other business, so in this, we want our Members and their sons and daughters to take their benefit through this Society We claim to be able to do this business with promptness and with a minimum of expense.

Withdrawals of Share Capital and Dividends can only be paid to the actual owner of the Shares, unless the person sent is provided with written authority and a Notice of Withdrawal Form duly signed by such owner of Shares. The Share Pass Book and Pass Card must be produced whenever a contribution to or a withdrawal from Shares is made. Children should not be sent to the Office either to receive or pay moneys.

Share, Building (Mortgage), and Penny Bank Books should be sent in regularly on or before dates given on almanac, and the importance of this cannot be too strongly impressed upon Members. When left, the Pass Card should have the amount standing in the Share Book entered thereon and same initialled.

The Current Quarter ends on January 13th, 1923, and Share Books should be sent in by the 6th day of month following.

Dividends will be paid at the Central on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, December 7th, 8th, and 9th between the hours of 10 a.m. to 12 noon, 2 to 4 p.m., and 6 to 7 p.m. Members are requested to bring their Pass Cards for production at the time of payment.

Children should not be sent to draw Dividends.
