SALES.—The Sales for the Quarter were £85,553, while for last Quarter they were £94,939 (14 weeks). For the corresponding period of last year they were £84,756.

More trade is required in several of the departments, noticeably Fish, Green-grocery, and the Milk Bar.

The quotas allotted to this society for 1938 are: Sales, £367,869, and Membership, 11,034, or an increase of £12,094 on the Sales over 1937, and 318 in our membership.

Up to the time of printing this report the increase of Sales is £4,527, and our Membership 233.

BREAD OUTPUT.—The output of Bread for the Quarter was 73,911 stones, as compared to 80,948 stones for the last Quarter (14 weeks), and 74,207 stones for the corresponding period of last year.

DIVIDEND.—We recommend the payment of a Dividend of 1s. 6d. in the £, and same will be paid out at the Central Premises on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, December 8th, 9th, and 10th, between the hours of 10 a.m. to 12 noon, 2 to 4 p.m., and 6 to 7 p.m.

DAIRY DEPARTMENT.—The number of gallons of Milk despatched from the Dairy Department for the last Quarter was 14,611 of tuberculin tested, and 31,650 gallons of loose Milk.

For the previous Quarter (14 weeks) it was 17,698 gallons of tuberculin tested, and 35,672 gallons of ordinary Milk, while for the corresponding period of last year the Sales were 15,821 of tuberculin tested, and 25,948 gallons of ordinary Milk.

Consequent upon the sale of Hogshell Farm arrangements have been made to procure the tuberculin tested Milk from two first-class dairies, and the pasteurised Milk is being purchased (bottled) from the C.W.S. Dairy at Fole, near Uttroter. We hope this arrangement will prove satisfactory, as every effort has been made to see that you get the very best quality in hygienic containers.

We still bottle the tuberculin tested in our Dairy Department.

MEMBERS' PURCHASES.—The average weekly purchases per Member for this Quarter is 12s. 1½d.

For the last Quarter it was 12s. 7d. per week, while for the corresponding period of last year equalled 12s. 3½d.

Mr. Stephenson died on October 19th, and Mr. Law on October 29th, the former having been in the service of the Society since August, 1907, and the latter since October, 1926.

Both were very competent members of the staff and were much respected. To their widows and families we extend our deepest sympathy in their bereavement.

The Farm has been disposed of and all produce, &c. sold. A full report will be given at the March, 1939, Meeting, when the accounts will have been completed.

We have had a long discussion on the question of method of Voting for the General Committee, but cannot find a better system than that at present prevailing. We do, however, ask the Shareholding Members to exercise their right and vote on the days of the Quarterly Meetings.

There are six nominees for three vacancies on the General Committee. The Election to take place on December 7th, 1938.

We thank the Members of the Society and the staffs in the various departments for their co-operation and assistance during the past, and look forward to greater expansion of the movement locally in the future.

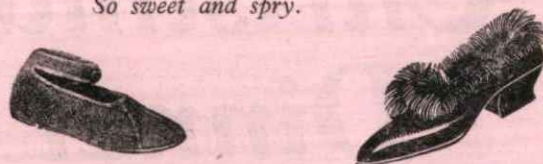
