## **Committee's Report**

FELLOW MEMBERS,

We have pleasure in presenting the Report of the Committee of Management for your approval. Further details and explanations will be given at the Half-yearly meeting, when we hope to get a good attendance.

MEMBERSHIP.—You will be pleased to note that our membership is keeping pace with the increased population. This shows that new people coming into the area are losing no time in seeking the advantages of Co-operation, and we have no doubt they find our premises and service of a very high standard. The number of enrolments this Half Year is 809, which, if allowing for withdrawals and lapsed accounts, brings the membership up to 21,910, an increase of 1,082 on 12 months ago.

CAPITAL.—The average deposits in shares alone total £4,326 per week. This vigorous saving, plus accumulated dividend, and the addition of compound interest, is still one of the most outstanding features in our accounts. It is hoped we shall reach the figure of £1 million in share capital during the coming year. The Christmas spending spree always takes its toll of savings, but compared with the corresponding period the total capital in all forms shows an increase of £29,800.

TRADE.—For the second time only, we have attained an increase in sales of over £100,000 in six months. To be exact £104,883 or 9.8 per cent. This makes a total increase of £177,761 for the year, and it is a performance of which we can be justly proud. Again nearly every department has contributed to these figures, which have not come without considerable effort on the part of Managers and Staff. In the Grocery Department records have been broken by the Supermarket and a number of branches, notably the Mobile Shop, Bolehall, Polesworth, and Amington, with Gillway, Dordon, Kingsbury, Dosthill, and Wood End also showing good increases. A remarkable recovery has been staged by the Economy Unit, and the new Stationery Department has done very well. All the Dry Goods Departments, including the Pharmacy, show excellent record figures, with the Central Drapery and Furnishing both getting an increase of over £10,000. The new Modern Man's Shop has made an encouraging start, and we trust it will continue to receive good support from our younger, trend-setting Members. Please give a hand to the Dairy staff who have delivered more milk per round per man (and woman) than ever before. The Butchery Department has had a difficult Half Year with market prices of meat reaching unprecedented levels; sales are up by over 12 per cent, a great deal accounted for by higher prices, but even so the weight of meat sold is a record. Our pork pies, sausage, cooked meats, and faggots, &c., are acclaimed as the best in the district.

There is no smugness or complacency in the camp, and we shall continue to set the sights higher, seeking increased efficiency and improved service wherever it can be obtained. STAFF.—One has only to look at the Situations Vacant columns in the National and Local Press to assess the difficulties of employers, particularly in the retail distributive trade. The competition for labour is extremely fierce, and there are some very unfair and peculiar tactics being employed to recruit staff. This Society has supported the National Wages Machinery as resolutely as can be expected of us, and at the same time we support the principle of Trade Unionism with a spirit of fairness and understanding. We have not given the staff all they would like but we must find the means of improving wages and conditions in step with the rightful share of benefit to the Members, whose trade and goodwill is our lifeblood. The wage bill is up by £9,486 and provision has been made for a special half-yearly bonus which does indicate improvements.

#### **OBITUARY**

With deep regret we record the death of one of the Senior Members of the Office staff, Mr. I. H. Wright, who had been in poor health for many years. Our sympathy is extended to his widow and family.

**DIVIDEND.**—With calculated resolve, and in anticipation of a reciprocal response from the Members, we feel very proud to recommend an increase in the rate of Dividend to 1s. 2d. in the £. After five years of stabilising the rate of 1s. during which time we have consolidated our position to gain increasing loyalty and confidence, there is now an opportunity of fulfilling our pledges by demonstrating the benefits of Co-operation in the truly traditional and tangible manner. At a time when the cost of living is such a problem to people and Government alike, we think it singularly appropriate to announce such wonderful news. If this rate is to be maintained we must all be prepared to increase our efforts, but we are absolutely convinced that further progress, and greater benefits are possible, given complete co-operative team work.

MEMBERS' ATTENTION is directed to Rule XX, whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense, and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

A new law has raised to £200 the total amount which may be nominated, but this applies to nominations made on or after 5th August, 1954.
