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# Committee's Report

FELLOW MEMBERS,

We have pleasure in presenting the Report of the Committee of Management, and trust it will meet with your approval. This brief synopsis of our activities for the last six months deserves to stimulate your wider interest, and once again we commend attendance at the Half-yearly Meeting.

MEMBERSHIP.—Over one thousand Members have been added to our register in the last twelve months, 578 of them since last January, and the Society now speaks and acts on behalf of 22,488 people. There are few homes in this district without Co-operative representation, and although some might be rather passive supporters of Co-operation, it does indicate the massive potential strength of this organisation if it could only be fully harnessed.

CAPITAL.—The effects of inflation do not give much encouragement to savers, but the excellent facilities for deposit and withdrawal provided by the General Office still make Co-operative forms of saving very popular. Largely as a result of dividend and interest being left to accumulate, we again show increases to reach new record figures, with Share Capital topping one million pounds for the first time. The Small Savings Accounts and our Christmas Club are also showing the right trend; the latter being a particularly attractive proposition for the wise shopper. Thousands of our Members now operate a current banking account with the C.W.S. Ltd. through our agency, in addition to the many clubs and organisations. The amount of business transacted is really quite phenomenal; in foreign money and travellers' cheques alone we have arranged thousands of pounds to assist Members with their holiday plans.

TRADE.—This Half Year is one of twenty-seven weeks, and therefore our Sales figures require a little qualification before strict comparisons can be made. Even allowing for this factor, however, we are able to show the highest increase ever recorded. Total Sales are £1,225,885, an increase of £166,659 or 15.7 per cent over the corresponding period. On a weekly basis the increase is £4,664 per week, or 11.4 per cent. A proportion of this must be attributed to higher prices, possibly in the region of 4 per cent, but it still leaves a net increase of weekly trade per Member which is quite encouraging. One penny per week per Member now produces nearly five thousand pounds in a year; a classic example of "take care of the pence and the pounds take care of themselves." We are quite aware that Sales alone do not reveal the complete picture, but it would be wrong to think that all this extra business came automatically for much of it is won by initiative and skill. The Grocery Department leads the field with the largest increase, although not quite first in percentage. Again the Supermarket deserves special mention, with new records to present a real challenge to the manager and his staff in future half years. Good support has come from Dordon, Amington, Polesworth, Kingsbury, Bolehall, Dosthill, Economy Unit, and Mobile Shop. The Butchery and Dairy have also notched good increases and set up new records. All the Dry Goods Departments have returned best-ever figures for the July period, with Men's Wear just beating Furnishing to first place, having been given a healthy boost by the Modern Man's Shop. The increase in the Furnishing Department is £13,471, which has only once been exceeded, and that was last year. Sales honours also go to the Stationery and Pharmacy, with the Coal Department too showing a welcome improvement. Credit should not be confined to only those in the limelight, for there are many of our staff

behind the scenes doing an excellent job of work, without whose contribution the Society could not function. Departments with less spectacular results do not expect to get a special mention, but it does not mean that effort is lacking, and often behind. the figures can be found unexcelled zeal, enthusiasm, and hard work.

GENERAL.—The Retail Distributive Trade and Co-operative Societies in particular continue to face very fierce competition, not only for trade, but perhaps more so for labour. The burdens of increased taxation and excise duty, controls on hire purchase, higher National Health contributions, increased postal charges, more rates and increases in every item of expense one can mention, together with all the other problems associated with an economy so desperately caught in the spiral of inflation, make it increasingly difficult to maintain not only our surplus, but our unique service to Members. We have resisted price increases to the best of our ability, and at the same time absorbed expenses as much as possible. Our staff want a five-day week, additional holidays and better wages like everyone else, and it can only be paid for out of the margin of profits on the goods we sell. We ask all Members to acknowledge these difficulties and to be as considerate as possible to those members of our staff who are providing them with a service. A little understanding and forbearance whilst we overcome our problems, is much appreciated.

STAFF.—General labour shortages place an increasing responsibility on our staff, and we are especially grateful for the loyalty and support given to the Society by our more stable employees, Fortunately, a hard core of very dependable people have remained with us, and the results obtained in the present circumstances reflect great credit on our managers and staff. Shorter hours and increased wages have been negotiated during the Half Year, and it will be observed that our wage bill has increased by £552 per week to a total of £158,466 for the Half Year.

**DIVIDEND.**—We have paid tribute in the Report to all those departments with such excellent sales figures, but it is also fitting to remember where that trade comes from. In our recommendation below for the distribution of the surplus we have striven to ensure that the maximum amount is returned in dividend. It is one of the best dividends in the Midlands, and half as much again as the national average, yet still we maintain that it could have been more—knowing that closer support for your own shops and services is bound to bring benefits and better facilities. "Co-operative Shopping" is the most sensible slogan of the present age. Please continue to adopt it with ever-increasing enthusiasm.

The total surplus available is £83,607, and we recommend its distribution as follows:

The amount saved can be spent in any Department of the Society, other than Wines and Spirits for which we operate a separate Club. Interest is added at the rate of 5 per cent in addition to full dividend. Further particulars given on application.

**CO-OPERATIVE TRAVEL SERVICE.**—Excellent holidays can be arranged through this Service, including your foreign currency requirements. Inquire at the Registered Office.

MEMBERS' ATTENTION is directed to Rule XX, whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense, and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

A new law has raised to £200 the total amount which may be nominated, but this applies to nominations made on or after 5th August, 1954.

Nominations made before that date are still valid, but up to £100 only. Members wishing to take advantage of the increased amount now allowed, must make a new nomination.

Full information may be obtained from the Office.

SHARES.-Maximum holding may now be increased to £1,000.
