Committee's Report

FELLOW MEMBERS,

The following facts, figures, and comments are but an extract of information about the activities of our Society during the six months ending 17th January, 1966. There is much more you could learn, and the best way is through attendance at the Members' Meeting (see Page 1). We present this Report as an account of our stewardship in this, the 80th year of the Society's history. We do so with a certain amount of pride, as we review the results of our co-operation together, which has built one of the strongest Co-operative centres in this country.

MEMBERSHIP.—More new Members enrolled this last six months than ever before, and our ranks have now been swelled to 23,201. We extend a sincere welcome to them all, in the hope that they will not only share the facilities which are offered but they will also try to contribute their efforts in sustaining and improving them. We need far more than just an entrance fee of 1s. 6d. One of these needs is capital to meet the ever-increasing demands of a modern system of retail distribution, and a few pounds of savings should be part of your responsibility towards the Society. Secondly, we need your trade in as many departments as possible; what we term comprehensive loyalty, and not taking all the bargains without making a genuine contribution to the dividend pool. Thirdly, and very important, we want your interest as active participators in Co-operation. We would welcome contenders to the Board of Management, and there is also room for some of you as employees to fill vacancies in a variety of occupations.

CAPITAL.—The total amount of Members' savings in Shares, Loan, and Penny Bank stands at £1,352,375; an increase of £37,989 as compared with last year. It is an impressive figure, but, of course, it is shared by over twenty-five thousand shareholders and depositors, many of whom have accumulated their savings through years of thrift.

TRADE.—Each year the target we set ourselves grows higher and higher. Once again our managers and staff have responded to the challenge, and we can now claim an annual turnover in excess of £2 $\frac{1}{2}$ million. The increase shown over the same period last year is £118,472 or 10·1 per cent. Nearly every department on the Society shares this increase, though with varying degrees of success, and the competition for Sales honours is very keen indeed. It is difficult to single out any one department because so many factors ought to be taken into consideration, but we certainly think that the 14 branches and departments with sales increases of over 10 per cent deserve a special mention. Increased sales, however, do not always indicate a higher surplus, and the problem of inflation continues to haunt the scene. In the last Budget the Chancellor of the Exchequer put a brake on consumer spending, and this has been felt very strongly in the Furnishing Department, where the demand for hire purchase shows a marked decrease; nevertheless, the department has still produced a new sales record. We have at last arrested the decline in bread trade, and we now look forward to re-establishing our position.

DEVELOPMENTS.—New Government restrictions have brought fresh frustrations to our plans for extension of the central premises, but an appeal has been lodged with the Ministry of Works, and the Town Council has promised to support us. At last we now get the opportunity of giving an improved service to our Hockley

Members, with the acquisition of the lease of the council-owned grocery shop in this estate. The branch opens under our ownership on the first day of the new Half Year. Keeping our eye on developments within the town centre, we have purchased the block of property in Church Street, previously owned by Mr. Eric Butler. The Pork Butchery and Chocolate Bar were taken over as a going concern, and we shall continue to operate these units as hitherto for the time being.

STAFF.—Difficult and trying weather conditions, together with an abnormally high incidence of sickness have severely tested our delivery services. We know that on certain rounds both bread and milk services have not been to the standard expected, and we have caused some Members inconvenience. However, even on those occasions when we have had 25 per cent absenteeism, we never failed to cover every one of our fifty-odd journeys, and great sacrifices have been made by those who struggled to keep things going. Delays in cash collection under these circumstances are surely understandable.

In general, the staff position does not grow easier, but one will find few firms in this area without this problem, as the Situations Vacant columns clearly indicate. Negotiations with the Trade Union, both locally and nationally, have been conducted in a spirit of mutual understanding, both sides seeking improvements in wages and conditions to the advantage of employee and Member alike.

OBITUARY

With deep regret we record the death of our Garage Foreman Mechanic, Mr. T. Smith, who died in August after 47 years' service. Also Mr. H. Wakelin, a retired member of the Delivery Staff. We extend our sympathy to the relatives concerned.

DIVIDEND.—Expenses have risen appreciably, and, to a large extent, completely outside the Society's control. In addition there are hidden burdens such as increased carriage charges and reductions in trade terms. To have absorbed these unfavourable factors is a commendable achievement, and, although largely due to the splendid sales increase, credit should be given to the Management team and the staff.

We are particularly pleased, therefore, to be able to recommend the same rate of dividend, which again is a record amount. The total surplus available is £88,192, and we recommend its distribution as follows:

CHRISTMAS CLUB.—Deposits received at any time in any Department or the Office from 1st January to 1st December. The amount saved can be spent in any Department of the Society, other than Wines and Spirits for which we operate a separate Club. Interest is added at the rate of 5 per cent in addition to full dividend. Further particulars given on application.

CO-OPERATIVE TRAVEL SERVICE.—Excellent holidays can be arranged through this Service, including your foreign currency requirements. Inquire at the Registered Office.

MEMBERS' ATTENTION is directed to Rule XX, whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense, and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

A new law has raised to £500 the total amount which may be nominated, but this applies to nominations made on or after 4th September, 1965.

Nominations made before that date are still valid, but up to £100 or £200 only. Members wishing to take advantage of the increased amount now allowed, must make a new nomination.

Full information may be obtained from the Office.

SHARES.—Maximum holding may now be increased to £1,000.

WITHDRAWALS of Share Capital and Dividend can only be paid to the actual owner of the Shares, unless the person sent is provided with written authority and a Notice of Withdrawal Form duly signed by the owner of the Shares. The Share Pass Book or Pass Card must be produced whenever a contribution to or a withdrawal from Shares is made. Children should not be sent to the Office either to receive or to pay money.

SHARE, LOAN, and SMALL SAVINGS BOOKS should be sent in regularly to be made up and audited, and the importance of this cannot be too strongly impressed upon Members. When left, the Pass Card should have the amount standing in the Share Book entered thereon and initialled.
