

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## **Committee's Report**

FELLOW MEMBERS.

In these two pages we give you a summary of the progress and events which have taken place during the six months from July, 1966 to January, 1967. Please do not expect to learn everything about our activities in these brief paragraphs, for this Society is involved in a very complex operation, providing a comprehensive service to over 14,000 homes from a hundred different units and rounds. We are constantly trying to improve this service, and the evidence of our effort in this direction is contained in this report and in the financial statements which follow. We submit them for your consideration, and trust they will meet with your approval, but in any event please attend the Half-yearly Meeting, where your questions and comments will be welcomed.

**MEMBERSHIP.**—The membership of the Society is now 23,426, which indicates a somewhat slower rate of growth than that experienced over the last few years. Part of this is accounted for by our revision of the share register, mentioned in the last report, but we have also noticed a marked increase in people leaving the district, and there is a much greater movement of population. This tendency, for a less settled community, is not favourable to trade, and adds other problems, especially for the delivery staff.

CAPITAL.—The adverse effect of families being unsettled also reflects itself in Members' savings, and this would, to some extent, explain why our capital is not keeping pace with increased membership. Furthermore, rising unemployment, short-time working and the wage freeze have resulted in some Members having less money. The total in shares, loans, and small savings is £1,313,809, still an amount never exceeded prior to 1964, but it does indicate that some responsibility rests with every Member, old and new, to share the financial commitments of this Society. A Member joins with an entrance fee of only 2s. 6d., and with one share of one pound can claim full membership rights, immediately inheriting the benefits which have accrued over generations of Co-operative effort. We therefore consider it fair to call on every Member to give support with a few pounds of savings, if only by leaving a small proportion of Dividend each Half Year.

TRADE.—The total Sales of all departments for the year amounted to £2,624,761, an increase of £110,810, with only fifty-two weeks against fifty-three. In these last six months the increase over the corresponding period is £64,493 or 5 per cent, only two departments having failed to set new records. All the others show the highest figures ever. The Furnishing Department has a decrease for the first time for many years, and we are sorry to see such a good progression of Sales increases broken as a result of the brake on consumer spending, imposed by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, in his very tight controls on hire purchase. When analysed, our Sales are not as good as we would wish, but it has been a difficult Half Year for some of our Members, and if there is less money going into the home, there is obviously less to spend in our shops. The best Sales figures are this time claimed by the Footwear and Wines and Spirits Departments, with the Supermarket, Glascote, Dosthill, Dordon Butchery, Modern Mans, and Coal also deserving our commendation. We start the New Year without any additional units, and the sternest tests to our salesmanship and business enterprise that we have ever had to face. Never was there a greater need to practise what is implied in our name.

EXPENSES.—The pressure of rising expenses constantly exerts a tremendous strain on our resources. Personnel costs alone have risen by £15,555, more than half of this being accounted for by the iniquitous Selective Employment Tax. Increased Graduated Pension contributions, payments to the Redundancy Fund, higher National Insurance, more duty on petrol, extra Road Fund Tax, higher insurance premiums, plus the sharing of these expenses with those firms who provide us with various goods and services have brought very acute problems. In all, the expenses have risen by no less than £20,256 over twelve months ago, which is the equivalent of 4d. in dividend.

DEVELOPMENTS.—All eyes will now be focused on the development of the Central Premises extensions. The old baths and institute building has been demolished and in eighteen months time we hope to see a complete new Mens' Wear Department. The Footwear Department will also figure prominently, and its various classes will be sited to enjoy their proper affinity with ladies' and gent's fashions. Many of our existing sections in both the Furnishing and Drapery are to be expanded and there will also be room for some new ventures. Another first for Tamworth will be the installation of two escalators, and we feel sure these are going to prove more popular than the lift. The main contract is again placed with the C.W.S. Ltd. Building Department, and it has been designed and planned by C.W.S. Architects.

STAFF.—There are, among our ranks, some of the finest employees one could find in any firm in the country. Many of them have served three and even four generations of Members' families. For example, there are two employees with over 50 years' service who have not yet reached retiring age, and more than fifty have served you for over 25 years. We should like to think that none of this is taken for granted but rather acknowledged and appreciated for many of the jobs are far from popular. It ought to be possible to so improve wages and conditions that Co-operative employment was really something to be envied. We believe that you would wish it to be that way, and it therefore ultimately becomes the responsibility of the Members to help us achieve this position. During the year a number of our employees have left on superannuation and best wishes are extended to them for a long and happy retirement.

#### **OBITUARY**

We regret to record the name of Mr. L. Layland, an employee in the Furnishing Department, who died suddenly while at work. Our sympathy is expressed to his wife and family.

DIVIDEND.—There was every sign in the early part of the Half Year that Dividend would take a sharp drop through the effects of two inflation-checking budgets and the Selective Employment Tax. The C.W.S. Dividend was also cut by 25 per cent, another severe blow. Fortunately we have so far been able to counter these adverse factors with some degree of success. A record amount is available for Dividend and we are able to recommend that the rate remains at 1s. 2d. in the £. Full details of the surplus are as follow:

CHRISTMAS CLUB.—Deposits received at any time in any Department or the Office from 1st January to 1st December. The amount saved can be spent in any Department of the Society, other than Wines and Spirits for which we operate a separate Club. Interest is added at the rate of 5 per cent in addition to full dividend. Further particulars given on application.

CO-OPERATIVE TRAVEL SERVICE.—Excellent holidays can be arranged through this Service, including your foreign currency requirements. Inquire at the Registered Office.

MEMBERS' ATTENTION is directed to Rule XX, whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense, and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

A new law has raised to £500 the total amount which may be nominated, but this applies to nominations made on or after 4th September, 1965.

Nominations made before that date are still valid, but up to £100 or £200 only. Members wishing to take advantage of the increased amount now allowed, must make a new nomination.

Full information may be obtained from the Office.

SHARES .- Maximum holding may now be increased to £1,000.

SMALL SAVINGS BANK.—Deposits are received at any time during office hours. Sums from 1d. to 40s, may be deposited, but not more than £50 can be on deposit at one time.

WITHDRAWALS of Share Capital and Dividend can only be paid to the actual owner of the Shares, unless the person sent is provided with written authority and a Notice of Withdrawal Form duly signed by the owner of the Shares. The Share Pass Book or Pass Card must be produced whenever a contribution to or a withdrawal from Shares is made. Children should not be sent to the Office either to receive or to pay money.
