

Committee's Report

FELLOW MEMBERS.

For the first time we present you with accounts covering a full year. It so happens that this also coincides with a 53 week period which as you know becomes necessary every 5 or 6 years to cover the odd day plus the extra day in leap years. Future comparisons will now be made far easier since all the statistics will be calculated on the same basis to facilitate the preparation of various returns both to Government Departments and to the Co-operative Union.

MEMBERSHIP.—The recruitment of new Members has continued at a steady pace though the high rate of turnover requires a more frequent revision of the Register which has this time resulted in the removal of 205 lapsed accounts. The revised total is 25,597 including nearly 4,000 non-trading Members.

CAPITAL.—The average amount of capital holding per Member continues to be one of the highest in the Country, but inevitably each year we lose some of the old Members who belonged to that era when the accumulation of dividend was such a popular form of thrift and trading loyalty to the Society was almost sacrosanct. The logic and good sense of such a policy was proved over and over again and still holds good today if we are Co-operatively minded. The total amount of Members Capital in Shares, Loans and Small Savings is £1,187,751, 89% of which is re-invested. Few businesses private or Co-operative can claim a more impressive financial position and we can think of no better aid to confidence than the sight of hard cash, which we can always produce if necessary.

TRADE.—It took the Society 65 years to reach sales of one million pounds per annum (1952), 11 years to reach the second million (1963) and now 7 years later we have attained three million pounds. Subject to the qualifications which a 53 week period requires we show an increase of £202,700 or 7.1% giving a record total of £3,056,701. Average weekly sales during 1969 were £57,673 compared with £54,884 in 1968, an increase of just over 5%. The size of these figures, large though they are as compared with our past experience, must now become the accepted minimum standards. Ten years ago an overall increase of 10% was achieved with less than two hundred thousand pounds, now we need over three hundred thousand pounds for the same result. Departments and Branches showing increases in excess of 12½% which we consider particularly meritorious were the Works, Hockley, Menswear, Funeral Furnishing, Bolehall, Glascote and Polesworth. Another figure we are sure will be of interest was a record week's sales before Christmas of nearly ninety thousand pounds.

Delivery operations in the rural areas are becoming increasingly difficult and expensive, but they are still the main source of contact with a large proportion of our Members. Many of these Members have traditionally been regarded as forming the back bone of the Society, and we are reluctant to withdraw services even though in individual cases they are often uneconomic. Only in the case of grocery parcels do we make any charge for delivery and there is no differential in the rate of dividend. This can only be equitable if Members utilise such services to the full and do not make a convenience out of them whilst taking a large share of their trade elsewhere.

DEVELOPMENTS.—Tamworth now has a Departmental Store worthy in size and facilities to an expanding town in the 1970's. It belongs to us, the Members of this Society and everyone concerned should be seeking to make it the finest possible example of business efficiency whilst still retaining some element of the personal touch which is so often lacking in the technique of our multiple competitors. Improvements are still being made and your Committee are continuously engaged in discussing and implementing ideas. We need the help and co-operation of the Members and though fair competition is often a useful spur we make no excuse for recommending the maximum support for your own business.

The Supermarket extension has yet to go through its most difficult stage. The old section is to be completely refurbished and therefore a temporary layout will be necessary. It would be of considerable help if more Members could shop in the early part of the week during this phase. Again we feel sure that Members will be proud of the new Store when it is finished.

have risen in price, but we can say with conviction and truth that few of the increases are of our making. There is, however, plenty of excuse or justification if we had been responsible for these increases, since the main items of expense over which we have little or no control show an ever more sharply rising curve. While the present economic state of the country continues; and there is every indication of inflation becoming worse than ever, our problems in trying to keep expenses in check, will grow more severe. Much as we support staff training we are bound to say that the Industrial Training Act is unlikely to bring results commensurate with the expense for some years. S.E.T. threatens to upset the whole system of taxation and our own case is an example of the unfairness of the position when in the last year we have been charged the outrageous sum of nearly £25,000.

Although we are not directly concerned with the replacement of milk bottles, we should like to remind Members that losses and breakages do affect the profit of our Dairy Department. The mis-use of milk bottles is a national disgrace, and causes a very serious problem for all processing dairies. Please help by rinsing and returning bottles daily.

STAFF.—The whole country is beset with labour troubles, and it is little wonder that we in the distributive trade find special difficulty with the recruitment of staff for certain vacancies. One of the major problems is the ever widening wage differencials between the engineering workers and ourselves, not forgetting the great attraction of a five-day week which provides for Saturday and Sunday off.

The value of conscientious and enthusiastic staff is incalculable, and it is quite obvious that we must have many such employees in our ranks, or we should never achieve sales of three million pounds. This is not confined to Sales Staff for we must also acknowledge the essential role performed by administrative and service personnel. For example, we are very encouraged by the growth in all forms of business conducted at the Public Counter in the General Office and all those responsible deserve credit.

CHRISTMAS SAVING STAMP CLUB—Stamps may be purchased at any time in Departments or the Office. The amount saved can be spent in any Department of the Society. Interest is added at the rate of 5 per cent in addition to full dividend. Further particulars given on application.

CO-OPERATIVE TRAVEL SERVICE.—Excellent holidays can be arranged through this Service, including your foreign currency requirements. Inquire at the Registered Office.

MEMBERS' ATTENTION is directed to Rule XX, whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

A new law has raised to £500 the total amount which may be nominated, but this applies to nominations made on or after 4th September, 1965.

Nominations made before that date are still valid, but up to £100 or £200 only. Members wishing to take advantage of the increased amount now allowed, must make a new nomination.

Full information may be obtained from the Office.

SHARES.-Maximum holding may now be increased to £1,000.

SMALL SAVINGS BANK.—Deposits are received at any time during office hours. Sums from 1d. to 40s. may be deposited, but not more than £50 can be on deposit at one time.

LOANS.—Deposits received at any time during office hours.

MEMBERS CHANGING THEIR ADDRESS should inform the Registered Office immediately.

The Co-operative Cleaners Limited operate a Laundry and Dry Cleaning Service in the Society's area. Dividend paid by this organisation is credited to the Members' share account at the rate they declare.

TWEN'TY WEEKS' CLUB.—We have in operation a Twenty Weeks' Club, for goods from the Furnishing, Drapery, Stationery, Outfitting, Boots, Coal, or Chemistry Departments. Vouchers of £1 minimum and £30 maximum are issued from the Office, to be repaid at the rate of 1s. per £ per week. Ask for details.

CO-OPERATIVE INSURANCE.—We are in a position to effect Insurances of all kinds—Life, Fire, Burglary, Motor, Live Stock, and Accident. The risk is covered by the Joint Insurance Department of the C.W.S. and S.C.W.S., and Co-operators should realise the necessity of some Insurance and apply at once to the Office for all information relating to the various branches of our Insurance business.

WITHDRAWALS of Share Capital and Dividend can only be paid to the actual owner of the Shares, unless the person sent is provided with written authority and a Notice of Withdrawal Form duly signed by the owner of the Shares. The Share Pass Book or Pass Card must be produced whenever a contribution to or a withdrawal from Shares is made. Children should not be sent to the Office either to receive or to pay money.

SHARE, LOAN, and SMALL SAVINGS BOOKS should be sent in regularly to be made up and audited, and the importance of this cannot be too strongly impressed upon Members. When left, the Pass Card should have the amount standing in the Share Book entered thereon and initialled.

HALF-YEARLY DIVIDEND WILL BE PAID IN THE NEW CENTRAL PREMISES, CHURCH STREET, TAMWORTH, ON THURSDAY, FRIDAY, AND SATURDAY, 19th, 20th AND 21st MARCH, BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 9 a.m. TO NOON, AND 1.30 TO 5 p.m. ON THURSDAY AND FRIDAY AND 9.0 a.m. TO NOON AND 1.30 TO 4.0 p.m. ON SATURDAY.
