Committee's Report

Fellow Members,

We present for your consideration and approval our report for the year ending 21st January, 1974.

Membership

The total number of members now on the register is 26,173, an increase of 831 on last year.

Capital and Reserves

The balances as listed on page 13, total nearly one and a half million pounds with members shares showing an increase of £32,108. It will be noted that the Society has completed the release of the whole of the monies belonging to the Employees Superannuation Fund which is now separately invested in the name of the fund in appropriate securities.

Investments

An examination of our investment folio will show that after honouring our commitments within the co-operative movement the rest of our investments are carefully spread between short, medium and long term trustee securities which are providing a very useful interest revenue. The total of all investments now stands at £1,107,252.

Trade

Whilst it was not our original intention to go 53 weeks this year, we felt that in view of the difficulties brought about by the power crisis, a little more time would be of considerable assistance with stock taking and our accountancy procedures. Sales comparisons must, therefore, be adjusted to compensate for the extra week. The net sales for the year reached a record total of £3,905,690 an increase of £427,910 or 12.3%. The weekly average was £73,692 an increase of 10.3% which allowing for further rationalisation of rounds operations and other closures mentioned in the interim report can be considered reasonably satisfactory. Every department shares in the increase to varying degrees and most of them can claim this to be in real volume terms. Progress has been retarded in many instances due to shortage of supplies and nothing is more frustrating to sales personnel than having to turn customers away. For example we could easily have sold an additional two hundred coloured television sets worth over £50,000 and that is only one commodity. Judging from the sales figures the extension to the Electrical Department and the new record bar has been well received and so too have the improvements to the Milk Bar. The Central Premises as a whole continue to make excellent progress and some very pleasing improvements in lay-out will have been noticed. Our Christmas windows were acknowledged to be absolutely first class, setting the whole town a fine example by their high standard. How disappointing for both the display and sales teams when we were prevented from using window lighting to set them off to full advantage.

Staff

During these days of one crisis after another it is all too easy to blame the sales assistants for higher prices, shortage of goods, faulty merchandise, poor lighting or a chilly temperature. In your moments of annoyance for any combination of these problems, please remember that it is not the fault of the person behind the counter, or indeed their supervisors. We are having a very difficult time and sorely need every bit of tolerance and understanding we can get from you the members. Please be assured that we are all trying to do our best to minimise your inconvenience and maintain a good service at fair prices.

There has only been one retirement during the past year — Mr. F. Childs of the Butchery Department after 51 years service. We thank him for this wonderful record of loyalty and wish him and his wife many years of good health and happiness.

Board of Management

The year has brought a number of changes on the Board of Management, and we have been pleased to welcome the addition of new colleagues. At the September meeting we paid tribute to the long and dedicated service given by Mr. L. Harper and Mr. F. W. Morgan who had both decided not to seek reelection. Our grateful thanks and acknowledgement of their fine co-operative example have been recorded and we extend them every good wish for the future.

Dividend

The number of Societies paying a cash dividend in the traditional way can now be counted on one hand, but whether the form of distribution be in cash or stamps, members can only get benefits of Co-operative trading in proportion to both their individual and collective loyalty. Our trade per member is amongst the highest in the country, but when we consider this is still below £3 per week there must be room for very substantial improvement.

The total amount available for distribution is £204,770 and having deducted £24,300 for share interest and £72,402 interim dividend, we recommend a dividend rate of $4\frac{1}{2}\%$.

Somehow we seem to thrive on difficulties and there have been many during the past year. Our grateful thanks are therefore especially deserved to all our staff who in turn thank you for your support.

CHRISTMAS SAVING STAMP CLUB—Stamps may be purchased at any time in Departments or the Office. The amount saved can be spent in any Department of the Society. Interest is added at the rate of 5 per cent in addition to full dividend. Further particulars given on application.

CO-OPERATIVE TRAVEL SERVICE.—Excellent holidays can be arranged through this Service, including your foreign currency requirements. Inquire at the Registered Office.

MEMBERS' ATTENTION is directed to Rule XX, whereby they may nominate the party to whom the money standing to their credit may be paid at their decease. If Members would attend to this rule the money could be transferred at their death free of expense and those entitled to receive the money saved a considerable amount of trouble.

A new law has raised to £500 the total amount which may be nominated, but this applies to nominations made on or after 4th September, 1965.

Nominations made before that date are still valid, but up to £100 or £200 only. Members wishing to take advantage of the increased amount now allowed, must make a new nomination.

Full information may be obtained from the Office.

SHARES.—Maximum holding may now be increased to £1,000.

SMALL SAVINGS BANK.—Deposits are received at any time during office hours. Sums from 1p to £2 may be deposited, but not more than £50 can be on deposit at one time.

LOANS.—Deposits received at any time during office hours.

WITHDRAWALS of Share Capital and Dividend can only be paid to the actual owner of the Shares, unless the person sent is provided with written authority and a Notice of Withdrawal Form duly signed by the owner of the Shares. The Share Pass Book or Pass Card must be produced whenever a contribution to or a withdrawal from Shares is made. Children should not be sent to the Office either to receive or to pay money.

SHARE, LOAN, and SMALL SAVINGS BOOKS should be sent in regularly to be made up and audited, and the importance of this cannot be too strongly impressed upon Members. When left, the Pass Card should have the amount standing in the Share Book entered thereon and initialled.
